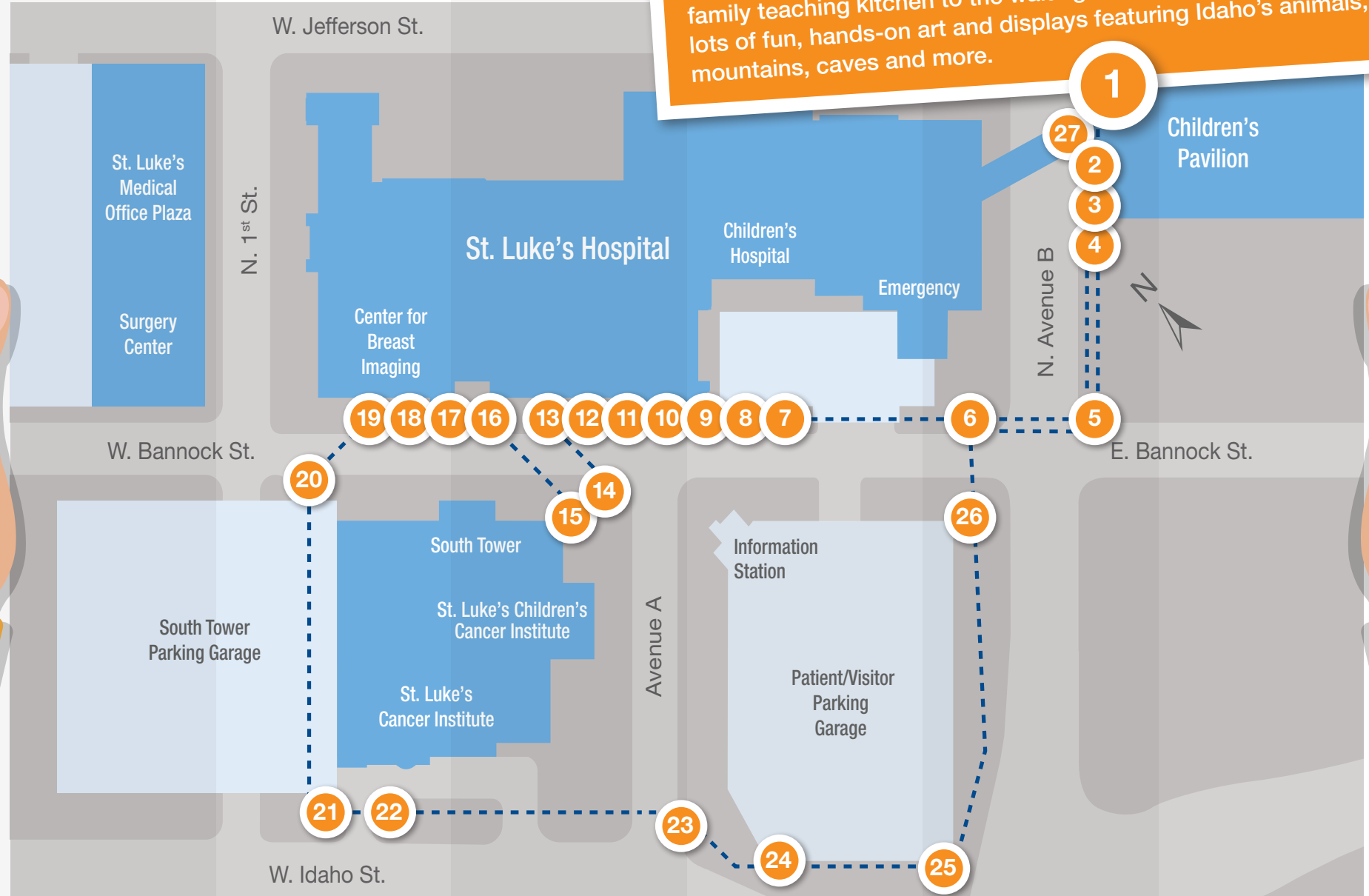


**Start at the Idaho Elks Children's Pavilion:**

Inside the Children's Pavilion, we take care of kids of all ages, from babies through teen-agers. Everything from doctors' offices to the family teaching kitchen to the waiting rooms are kid-friendly with lots of fun, hands-on art and displays featuring Idaho's animals, mountains, caves and more.



*This tour is designed for children who are supervised by an adult and are old enough to cross Avenue B.*

You're at the corner of Jefferson Street and Avenue B, in front of the Idaho Elks Children's Pavilion. Can you find 2 large animal sculptures? What color are they? Do you know what kind of animals they are? How are they different from each other?

2

Without crossing any streets, go south or turn left on Avenue B toward more animal sculptures. What color are they? What are the animals on the ground? Can you find a butterfly?

Can you find another animal in the sky above you? Can you tell what it is?

4

Can you see the structure that connects 2 buildings? Where is it? Do you know what it's called? Can you see a pattern on it? What does that pattern look like?

5

Can you go to the nearest crosswalk? This crosswalk features a "rapid flashing beacon." Can you activate it and follow the blinking man signal to safely cross Avenue B?

6

Go forward to the road that leads to the entrance of St. Luke's. You are now on Bannock Street. Do you know where the name "Bannock" comes from?

7

Are there flowers blooming nearby? What colors are they?

8

Can you see the main entrance to the hospital? Have you ever been to the hospital before?

9

Can you find 3 flag poles? Do you know what the blue flag with the round seal represents?

10

Can you find the sign that says "EMERGENCY" on it?

11

Do you see a limestone beam with "St. Luke's Hospital" on it? Can you find where it says the year St. Luke's started?

12

Go straight ahead between the 2 brick pillars to what is called the Bannock Corridor. Do you see a blue and white sign? What does it have on it? What does it mean? Do you see examples of the pictures on the sign?

What do you notice in this corridor?

14

Can you find a large circular pattern in the shade? Do you know what a labyrinth is? Can you follow the lighter path from beginning to end and return to where you began?

15

Can you find a green gate to a small playground? Can you see 4 of the animals in that playground? Which animal is lying on its back? Which 2 are on their tummies? Which one is slow? Which one hops?

16

Go back to the Bannock Corridor and find a small fountain.

17

Do you see large round pots with trees and flowers in them? How many can you count?

18

There is a statue of a lady wearing a cape and a cap nearby. Can you find it? Who do you think she is? Do you know anyone who is a nurse? Have you ever been taken care of by a nurse?

19

Can you find pink ribbons on the building at the end of the corridor? How many can you find?

20

When you reach the sidewalk, go left and you will pass through a tunnel. What is above you?

21

When you're out of the tunnel, can you find the bus stop?

22

In front of the bus stop is a "cycle track" for bicycles, scooters and skateboarders. Can you see it? How many lanes does it have? What is between the lanes? Notice how it's protected from cars in the street.

23

Go along the sidewalk next to the cycle track, moving forward toward Avenue A. Can you find a round yellow sign that has "P4" on it?

24

You will move alongside an underground parking garage. How many levels of parking can you count?

25

Have any Air St. Luke's helicopters landed on the hospital roof while you were exploring?

26

Can you return to the crosswalk with the "Broadway and N. Ave B" sign?

27

Cross the street here. You can see 2 tall trees on the side of the building ahead. Did you know Boise is called "City of Trees"?
